

Prophetess Hazel Scott Biography

Prophetess/Dr. Hazel Scott is a native of Screven County, Georgia, and the daughter of Deacon Usher and Mrs. Queen Scott. She holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Savannah State College (now University) with a major in Social Science and a minor in Elementary Education, Health and Physical Education. She also holds a Master's of Religious Art in Theology and a Doctor of Religious Philosophy in Christian Psychology. Dr. Scott was ordained by Bishop Bill (William) Gilbert and Bound by the Covenant in the Prophetic Office.

For more than 30 years, Prophetess Scott worked in the Chatham – Savannah Public Schools.

In the late 1970's, she became an ordained minister of the gospel under the Rev. H. Fields at St. Peter's. She serves as a builder and organizer of Scott Temple (now Resurrection Pentecostal Temple, Inc.) and has pastored for the 34 years.

During the Civil Rights Movement, Rev. Henry Howard of Augusta, GA, and Hazel Scott sponsored by Hoyot Hair Products contacts WTOC which gave quartets, choirs, solos and gospel singers the opportunity to sing on television for the first time. This lasted for a period of three years.

Hazel Scott and The Gospel Sermonettes under the administration of WW Law would sing for the N.A.A.C.P. every Sunday afternoon during the movement and marched with great preachers of Savannah, also along with Rev. Jessie Jackson.

For 28 years, Prophetess Scott showcased gospel music and invited guests on WSOK radio. She was also employed with WIZA for a year and a gospel singer on WJTV & WDAR. She was founder/organizer and manager of The Gospel Sermonettes, Gospel Chimes and Shirley Caesar Evangelistic Choir. She has sang with many gospel singers, too many to name.

Prophetess Scott was inducted into the Who's Who of Alfred Ely Beach, Women of the Month (The Savannah Tribune), Women of Year twice from Alfred Ely Beach High School Alumni, inducted into the Hall of Fame of Gospel Singers and Gospel Pioneers.

Hazel Scott holds memberships in A. Philip Randolph Institute, Life and Legacy Life Member of the National Council of Negro Women (NCNW); Spiritual Covering for Bishop C. Lonnon and Board member of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Observance Day Association, Inc. and a member of NAACP.
