



**Wanda Lloyd**, the former chair/associate professor in the Department of Journalism and Mass Communications at Savannah State University in Georgia, is a retired newspaper editor with more than four decades of editing roles at seven daily newspapers. She retired from the Gannett, Co., in 2013, after serving nine years as executive editor of the *Montgomery (Ala.) Advertiser*. The same year she accepted the position at Savannah State. Lloyd is also the founding executive director of the Freedom Forum Diversity Institute at Vanderbilt University in Nashville.

Lloyd was previously senior editor/days and administration at *USA TODAY*, where she also served earlier as deputy managing editor/cover stories and managing editor/newsroom administration. She was managing editor at *The Greenville (S.C.) News*. She has also worked as an editor at *The Washington Post*, the *Providence Evening Bulletin*, the *Miami Herald* and the *Atlanta Journal*. Lloyd has been a four-time juror for the Pulitzer Prize. She is co-author/co-editor of "The Edge of Change: Women in the 21st Century Press," published in October 2009 by University of Illinois Press.

Lloyd currently serves on the Executive Council for AARP Georgia, the Accrediting Committee for Journalism Education and she chairs public relations for the MLK Jr., Observance Day Association, Inc. She is a member of the Savannah chapters of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., and The Links, Incorporated.

Lloyd served on the Board of Trustees of Spelman College -- her alma mater -- for 19 years. In 2016 Spelman awarded her with an honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters.

Lloyd, who grew up in Savannah and graduated from A.E. Beach High School, is currently a consultant for journalism issues and personal branding, and she is writing a memoir.
